A big one from across the pond. The US government has sued **Apple** in a <u>landmark</u> antitrust case over accused monopolisation of the smartphone market. **The Verge** with <u>five key takeaways</u>.

DCMS Secretary Lucy Frazer is 'minded to refer' the Telegraph takeover bid by the UAE-backed RedBird IMI to the Competition and Markets Authority.

The G7 countries, including the UK and USA, have <u>signed an agreement</u> to work together to harness the potential of AI to drive growth.

Dame Mary Archer, former chair of the **Science Museum**, will lead a government review of the use of public money by **Arts Council England**.

Film & TV

British fashion label **Ted Baker** is set to go into administration, threatening almost 1,000 jobs.

French luxury house **Hermès** is being sued in California over claims it only sells its famous Birkin handbag to <u>'worthy' customers</u>. Had an order pending for months now...

Music & Audio

Spotify paid \$9 billion in royalties to artists in 2023, according to its latest annual *Loud* & *Clear* report.

Joe Rogan's podcast pulls in almost 3x more listeners on Spotify than the second-most popular.

There's been a 400% surge in mental health cases among musicians and performing artists since COVID, according to **BAPAM**.

Coldplay (again), Raye and Chase & Status are to headline this year's Radio 1 Big Weekend in Luton.

The **BPI** is <u>threatening legal action</u> against voice cloning site **Voicify** if it doesn't stop enabling users to make unauthorised music deepfakes.

Boyz-N-The Hollywood Walk of Fame. **Dr Dre** has been honoured with a star.

UK licensing company **PPL** is marking the big 9-0 with a new £1m annual fund to 'give back to music'.

Youth Music has announced a <u>new £1.5m Energiser Fund</u> for early years creativity - and found that 20% of toddlers enjoy rock music. Barely Talking Heads.

Gaming

Epic Games has now got the backing of the big guns **Meta**, **Microsoft** and **X** in its battle with **Apple**.

The Guardian takes us <u>back to the 90s</u> when the **Trocadero** in London was the centre of the video game universe. Simpler times.

Tech

Well, well. What do we have here then? **Apple** and **Google** are <u>in discussions</u> to bring the latter's generative AI to **iPhones. Business Insider** on what this <u>could mean</u>.

On that note... **Apple** has also quietly unveiled details of its own MM1 Al model. **Wired** says it shows a sleeping giant <u>rising from its slumber</u>.

But wait! **Microsoft** is hiring **Inflection** CEO and **DeepMind** co-founder **Mustafa Suleyman** to lead **Microsoft Al** (along with most of Inflection's key staff). They're paying \$650m in licensing, too.

Reddit had a rather successful IPO, opening up 38% on the New York stock exchange. Share sales put the value of the platform at \$6.4bn.

A quadriplegic person who was the first to be implanted with a **Neuralink** brain chip has been shown playing chess on a laptop with his mind. Quite amazing.

Nvidia has just shown off its new, next-generation GPU which will be the world's most powerful chip for AI.

And they (Nvidia) are on the top spot of Fast Company's list of the world's most innovative companies in 2024. Chips ahoy!

<u>Nearly half of UK families</u> lack the digital skills to fully participate in modern digital society, according to research led by the **University of Liverpool**.

A leading psychologist has <u>quit her advisory role</u> with **Meta** over their failure to remove self-harm content from **Instagram**.

The UK had <u>the largest rise</u> in patent applications across Europe last year, according to the **European Patent Office.**

Saudi Arabia is reportedly working on a \$40bn Al investment fund with VC firm Andreesen Horowitz.

Vodafone is flogging <u>its Italian business</u> to **Swisscom** for €8bn - and **Three** (who Vodafone is looking to buy) has posted its <u>first annual loss</u> since 2010.

Humane has previewed <u>new upcoming features</u> for its **Ai Pin**, coming mid-April, including Al nutrition and Al-powered fit checks. Could help a few people...

Al startup **Cohere** is seeking <u>a \$5bn valuation</u> in its latest fundraising round. But **The Information** reports that annual revenue is currently only <u>at around \$13m</u>.

Startup Coalition has launched its first *ClimateTech Index*, showing that the top 1,000 UK climate-tech startups are worth a combined £26bn.

A UK startup is <u>sending 4K cameras</u> to the **International Space Station** to beam back HD footage of Earth. Zoom in. I'm waving. Ok zoom out now. ZOOM OUT.
